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THE LITTLE PRINCESS TRUST

THE Little Princess Trust has now been providing free, real hair wigs to children and young people for 20 years.

You might be surprised by how Thousands of young people who lost their own hair due to cancer treatment have had their confidence restored after receiving a wig from the charity. A service, recently held inside Hereford Cathedral to mark the 20th anniversary, heard how The Little Princess Trust has grown into the largest wig charity in the world.

Those present were told that Simon Tarplee and Wendy Tarplee-Morris started The Little Princess Trust in memory of their daughter Hannah, who was just five years old when her life was tragically cut short due to cancer. Simon said: "Hannah was deeply caring - her natural empathy took my breath away. After we lost her, we wanted her kindness to keep moving in the world. That wish became a promise; that promise became The Little Princess Trust."

The charity began funding childhood cancer research in 2016 and the cathedral service heard from one scientist now being funded by The Little Princess Trust who had previously received a wig.

Dr Catherine Pointer was given a wig in 2009 when her leukaemia relapsed and explained that when a child is diagnosed with cancer "every ounce of control is stripped away".

"You forget what normal feels like, and you can no longer recognise your own reflection," she said. On explaining how her wig

helped her, Dr Pointer said:
"But there are moments
where you actually feel
OK. Where you are well
enough to go out and
see friends and do
normal things.

"And on those days being able to look like yourself and not be pitied or stared at make an immeasurable difference.

"It's a boost that keeps you going and reminds you of the life you're fighting for."

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EARN how to make a gingerbread house with our simple biscuit recipe and design template. Kids will love getting involved with baking and decorating them.

Ingredients

For the gingerbread

- 250g unsalted butter
- 200g dark muscovado sugar
- 7 tbsp golden syrup
- 600g plain flour
- 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 4 tsp ground ginger

To decorate

- 200g flaked almonds
- 2 egg whites
- 500g icing sugar plus extra to dust
- 125g mini chocolate fingers
- generous selection of sweets
 of your choice, choose your own colour theme
- 1 mini chocolate roll or a dipped chocolate flake
- few edible silver balls

For the house design, see 'Method' below.

Method

1 Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Melt the butter, sugar and syrup in a pan. Mix the flour, bicarbonate of soda and ground ginger into a large bowl, then stir in the butter mixture to make a stiff dough. If it won't quite come together, add a tiny splash of water.

2 Cut out the template (download from the tips below). Put a sheet of baking paper on a work surface and roll about one quarter of the dough to the thickness of two £1 coins. Cut out one of the sections, then slide the gingerbread, still on its baking paper, onto a baking sheet. Repeat with remaining dough, re-rolling the trimmings, until you have two side walls, a front and back wall and two roof panels. Any leftover dough can be cut into Christmas trees, if you like.


3 Pick out the most intact flaked almonds and gently poke them into the roof sections, pointy-end first, to look like roof tiles. Bake all the sections for 12 mins or until firm and just a little darker at the edges. Leave to cool for a few minutes to firm up, then trim around the templates again to give clean, sharp edges. Leave to cool completely.

4 Put the egg whites in a large bowl, sift in the icing sugar, then stir to make a thick, smooth icing. Spoon into a piping bag with a medium nozzle. Pipe generous snakes of icing along the wall edges, one by one, to join the walls together. Use a small bowl to support the walls from the inside, then allow to dry, ideally for a few hours.

5 Once dry, remove the supports and fix the roof panels on. The angle is steep so you may need to hold these on firmly for a few mins until the icing starts to dry. Dry completely, ideally overnight. To decorate, pipe a little icing along the length of 20 mini chocolate fingers and stick these lengthways onto the side walls of the house. Use three, upright, for the door.

6 Using the icing, stick sweets around the door and on the front of the house. To make the icicles, start with the nozzle at a 90-degree angle to the roof and squeeze out a pea-sized blob of icing. Keeping the pressure on, pull the nozzle down and then off – the icing will pull away, leaving a pointy trail. Repeat all around the front of the house. Cut the chocolate mini roll or dipped Flake on an angle, then fix with icing to make a chimney. Pipe a little icing around the top. If you've made gingerbread trees, decorate these now, too, topping each with a silver ball, if using. Dust the roof with icing sugar for a snowy effect. Lay a winding path of sweets, and fix gingerbread trees around and about using blobs of icing.

Your gingerbread house will be edible for about a week.



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

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FESTIVE HANGOVER 'CURES'... DO THEY WORK?

HE festive season is upon us once more, and for some it's the time of year for over-indulgence in alcohol. It's little wonder, then, that people the world over have sought remedies to mitigate the dreaded hangover.

Here we put some of the better known myths to scientific scrutiny.

Does lining your stomach work?

There is a widely held belief that a glass of milk before a heavy session can help to lessen the effects of alcohol by 'lining your stomach'.

Some Mediterranean countries prefer to line their stomach with a spoon of olive oil. But, biologically speaking, there is no such thing as "lining your stomach". If there is any effect, it is through slowing your stomach emptying.

Around 20% of alcohol is absorbed in the stomach and the rest is absorbed in the intestine. So any food containing fat, protein or, to some extent, carbohydrate that delays your stomach emptying could have a very modest effect on slowing down the absorption of alcohol.

A hearty breakfast mops up remaining alcohol

A recent survey of 2,000 found that a fried breakfast is the preferred remedy for Brits battling the aftermath of a heavy night. It also reported that 26% of popular hangover cures rely on a dish that contains



Coffee sobers you up

A study that looked at the effects of caffeinated versus non-caffeinated alcoholic drinks on a simulated driving task, found that caffeine did little to mitigate the effects of alcohol on driving ability or reaction time. Other studies have found that caffeine can increase alertness but not improve feelings of dizziness or restore memory.


Mixing caffeine and alcohol also increases your risk of injury on a night out, so they're not a good combo


